## **Events with live flying-foxes resume**

No bat nights were organised in Gordon because the flying-fox camp has been unpredictable. In 2023 the flying-foxes did not return to Gordon from their winter travels until November. A count on November 8 recorded 7,540, on December 13 there were only 2,550 and on February 29 the count was 6,090 bats.





Prior to 2021 the average number for February was 32,259.

Ku-ring-gai Council staff and volunteers continue to estimate the number of flying-foxes and map their extent in the reserve each month.

Powerful owls bred in this reserve again last year. An adult and juvenile were seen in October 2023.

## Bushcare continues in Ku-ring-gai Flying-fox Reserve

Volunteers Karen, Jill and Nancy continue to meet on some Tuesdays. Haley Henning has formed a group which meets on the first Saturday of each month.

The **Saturday Bushcare Group** aims to continue collecting temperature and humidity data, monitor the fauna cameras and potentially expanding monitoring activities to include flora species lists of exclosures and creek erosion monitoring. Other wildlife spotted in the reserve by wildlife cameras, and sharp eyes include echidnas, wallabies, lyrebirds, bandicoots and a lace monitor.





Both groups will continue to maintain the wallaby exclosures and remove priority weeds.

KBCS donated to the Nature Conservation Council of NSW to support efforts to prevent logging of habitat of koalas, greater gliders which is also vital for flying-foxes and microbats.
