NSW Forestry Logging

KBCS recently completed a submission for the Independent Forestry Panel with regards to ending native forest logging within NSW State Forests. Loss of habitat remains the primary threat to flying foxes and we urge all members to contact your government representatives, or sign a petition. Link between bat death and infant mortality in the US

The Guardian reported recently on a study uncovering a tragic link between the death of bats in the US due to white-nose disease, and mortality in children. In areas where bats were wiped out due to white-nose disease, the farmers were forced to compensate by increasing the use of insecticides, which in turn affected infant mortality. 

A highlight this month was finding evidence of recent Powerful Owl activity in the reserve, despite the sad find of a dead owl several months ago. A number of owl pellets (undigested/regurgitated parts of the owl's meal) were found amidst droppings right beside our tool store. Haley Henning's Saturday group meets on the first Saturday of each month – the trees planted by this group, a great mixture of native species - are flourishing!
